There are quite a few books out there about death and dying, and I've read most of them. This is one of the very best: clear, compassionate, comprehensive. Her chapter titles show how rich this resource is: Why are we afraid to die? Legal issues; Medical issues; Miracles and cures; Our own demons; Preparing for the end of life; Working with congregations; Knowing the options; Focusing on transformation. She has also done a terrific job of research and sets forth a wealth of materials in the Appendices in a concise, easy-to-use fashion. The book is only 164 pages long, and is easily read, but it is huge in content. My main criticism is the title: this book should NOT be limited to clergy but should be read by any intelligent, caring person who wants to be of genuine service to someone who is dying. Strongly recommended.
