

It seems that Mr. Steves is more concerned about his political views than giving us good travel info, at times. 'Even suitable for a Republican to dine at' and 'Republicans might be shaking from the customs' were a couple of examples (not verbatim) and he criticized Norway's whaling culture, but approved of Denmark's permissive culture toward drugs and sex. Ok, ok... I'll stop my rant. I just was hoping for more travel substance and less politicizing. The book was geared toward the population centers, so you might not get the info outside of the two largest cities in each country... was hoping for more out of the way information. Also, not too much info on driving. Geared more toward rail travel, which is ok and probably better for students traveling abroad. On the plus side, he had a kind of cool trip suggestion based on the number of days you have available (from 3 to 21 days), but again it is based on the larger cities. I think I will look for more specifics by getting individual books for each country.
