


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# Ruthless River: Love And Survival By Raft On The 's Relentless Madre De Dios (Vintage Departures)



## Synopsis

On a small, soon-ravaged raft that quickly becomes their entire universe through dangerous waters alive with deadly animals and fish, their only choice: to continue on, despite the rush of insects swarming them by day, the sounds of encroaching predators at night. Without food or means of communication, with no one to hear their cries for help or on a search-and-rescue expedition to find them, the author and her husband make their way, fighting to conquer starvation and navigate the brute force of the river, their only hope for survival, in spite of hunger and weakening resolve, to somehow, miraculously hang on and find their way east to a large riverside town, before it is too late. . . .

I'm a big fan of survival and nature adventure stories, and even better when they are true(!), so this grabbed my attention right away. Holly FitzGerald and her husband set off on the adventure of their dreams for a late honeymoon, a year into their marriage. While exploring South America on an extended trip, they planned to cross the continent by boating down the Madre de Dios River, through the jungle, and eventually presumably through the River to the East coast. After some daunting setbacks that might have derailed their optimism, including their plane crash landing

near a Peruvian penal colony, and finding out that the boat ride that they thought existed, really didn't exist. They forged ahead on a path that grossly miscalculated the dangers ahead. Filled with youth, love, and a spirit of adventure, they naively accepted advice about the simplicity of rafting down the Madre de Dios without a guide, map, adequate supplies, or much knowledge of the rainy season river conditions. The harrowing story of what went wrong next and how they survived, kept me racing through chapters as if my survival was bound up with theirs. The enchanting descriptions of a vast, untamed wilderness with all its exotic beauty and thrills, along with the fierce forces of nature and frightening array of deadly creatures and howls, filled the story with an awesome sense of the majesty of the . The tenderness, humor, and pathos of Fitz and Holly's relationship, perseverance, and undying hope, delights the reader with a compelling and simple story of humanity. And the warm kindness of the local peoples that they meet throughout the story give a charming glimpse of the generosity of their culture and the humor of navigating foreign customs and foods. The story of their survival is incredible, and I don't want to give away any details, but by the time they are rescued, I was so emotionally bound up with the story that I felt the sheer mixture of joy, fear, and finally overwhelming gratitude they experienced, at being saved. There are so many other fascinating dimensions to the story; but suffice it to say that I tore through the book in 3 days (2 which were very busy days, I might add) and I found the story compelling, humorous, suspenseful, and also a great adventure in itself. I only wish there were a bigger map in the book—but I found the spot fairly easily on Google Maps satellite imagery—and it's truly amazing how isolated they were and how slim the chances of rescue were in the vastness of the wilderness. A great read, an inspiration, and a good reflection on the simple goodness of life and love!

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
