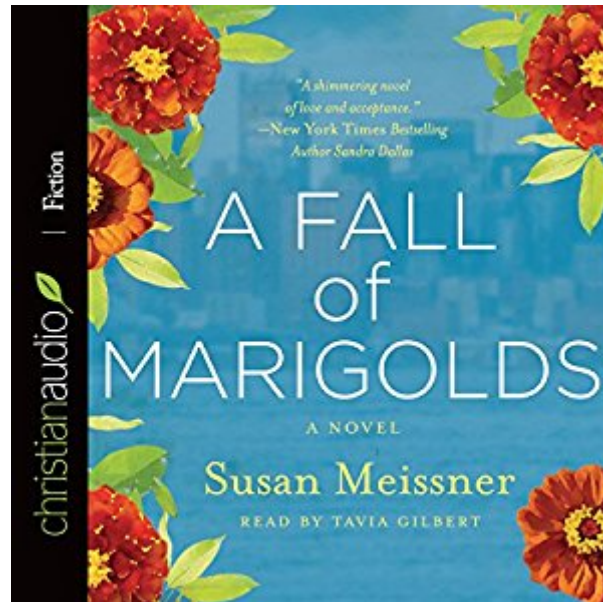

There are several great and soothing moments that I take away from this excellent novel.

I enjoyed this novel the best of 3 I have read by the author. The parallels drawn between the Triangle shirtwaist factory tragedy and the horrors of 9/11 are quite unique. I had never considered the ideas before, although I have researched and read extensively about both. I was in NYC on 9/11 for a business meeting just 34 blocks away from the towers which is why I was drawn to novel. Taryn's anguish and PTSD symptoms were well voiced by Ms. Meissner. I appreciated her compassionate way of putting realistic characters into the telling of these two historical tragedies.

While the settings in this novel are interesting, the character development is woefully thin. Is this a Romance novel? Light read at best

I found the book on a list of recommended books. I chose the book because of the historical connections. However, it was one of the most confusing books I've read in a long while. It jumped back and forth from event to event in an abrupt and disjointed way. Yet, each chapter took too long to get to the point. I was very disappointed.

I am trying to figure out why I seem to be one of the few people who did not give this book rave reviews. I felt it was not that well written, the plot was boring. Yes, it is a blend of 1911 and 2011, but I felt both of the story lines were not very well developed. The 1911 part of the book was so drawn out, I was having a hard time finishing the book. I will say I did find it fascinating reading about the

1911 Triangle Shirtwaist Fire. Recently read "The Orphan Train" which I thought was much better.
