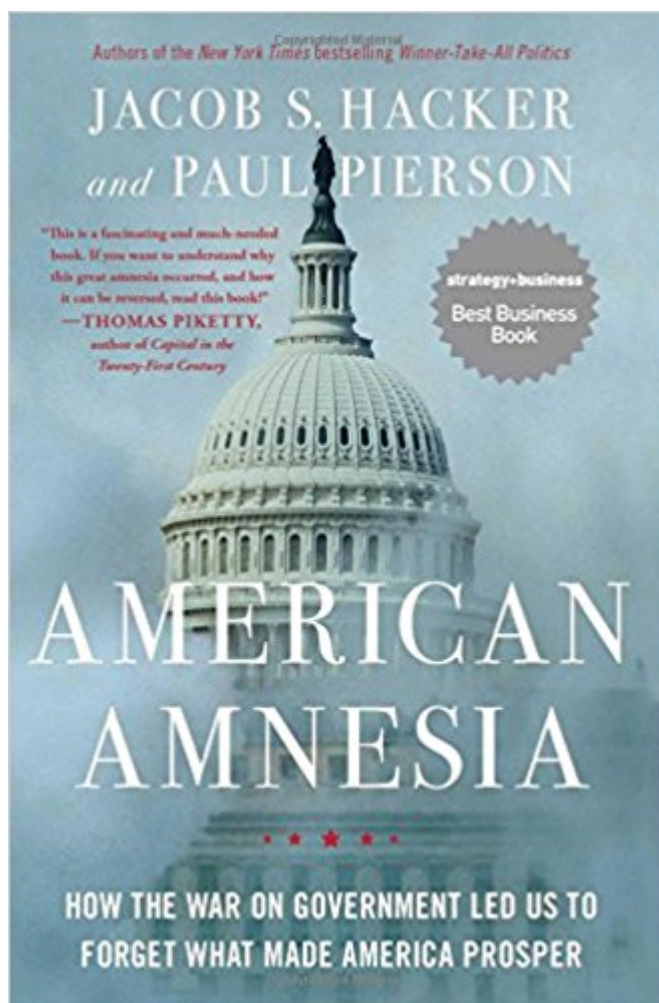


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American Amnesia: How The War On Government Led Us To Forget What Made America Prosper

We have largely forgotten this reliance, as many political circles and corporate actors have come to mistakenly see government as a hindrance rather than the propeller it once was. “*American Amnesia* is more than a rhetorical phrase; elites have literally forgotten, or at least forgotten to talk about, the essential role of public authority in achieving big positive-sum bargains in advanced societies. The mixed economy was the most important social innovation of the twentieth century. It spread a previously unimaginable level of broad prosperity. Looking at this record of remarkable accomplishment, they recoil in horror. And as the advocates of anti-government free market fundamentalist have gained power, they are hell-bent on scrapping the instrument of nearly a century of unprecedented economic and social progress. America's "mixed economy," in which the private sector and the government each do what they do well has been the key to the most successful economy in history. The nation pulled together in the second world war and that was followed by a few decades of phenomenal growth in the private sector and an expansion of public programs that were beneficially complementary to the private sector. The private sector performs better when the government is functioning well. In recent decades the balance of the mixed economy has tipped, largely due to the infusion of antigovernment ideology into our politics. Instead of cooperating in perpetuating what has worked well, we have become highly polarized with control being assumed by the plutocracy whose primary tool has become government obstructionism. By suppressing the government role in public programs and regulation we are seeing a deterioration in incomes, retirement plans, health care affordability, infrastructure maintenance, and a failure to improve our education systems, just to mention a few. A well balanced mixed economy works for everyone - individuals and families, and businesses. It even works well for the plutocracy, although it would slow, though not eliminate, the transfer of wealth from hard working American families to the billionaires at the top. Libertarians who live in the Ayn Rand fantasy world (Hard Randians) would continue to complain, never quite understanding the important complementary role that government does play in making this a better society for all of us. On reading *American Amnesia* you will understand why we have to abandon the politics of polarization and join together in supporting the appropriate roles of markets and our government in incentivizing a properly balanced mixed economy that in the past had served us so well. It can do so again.

An interesting look at some economic pictures past and present. Especially if we are interested in making America great again. To pursue such a quest we need to determine when we considered our nation to be at its greatest and then look at data that generated that feeling and compare it to current data. Only then can we compare what we are doing now to recapture that greatness. The authors talk much about America mixed economy through much of the 20th century and how that

economy has been supplanted in the 21st century. A good book for those really interested in the economics of America's past greatness and how our country's attitudes toward taxation and government involvement in the economy have changed.

I loved this book! The authors provide the history of how the involvement of government in society has brought about economic and social success as compared to other rich nations. Hacker and Pierson have done us all a great favor in writing this book.
